(2) Lesson content

<Beginner level>

(School) Subject	Target
General Japanese	We aim to comprehensively develop listening, reading, speaking, and writing skills so that students can engage in basic communication in situations commonly encountered in daily life.
Listening Comprehension	Students will listen to conversations in situations commonly encountered in daily life and aim to understand the speaker's intentions.
Conversation	The goal of this course is to familiarize students with greetings and conversations commonly used in daily life, and to enable them to respond appropriately.
Reading comprehension	Students are expected to be able to read and understand the content of short sentences using the words and sentences they have learned.
Characters and vocabulary (Kanji)	The goal of this course is to learn how to read and write Kanji characters necessary for daily life and to acquire vocabulary.

<Intermediate level>

(School) Subject	Target
General Japanese	Students will learn basic Japanese grammar and vocabulary and be able to use them to communicate in everyday situations.
Grammar (JLPT)	The goal of this course is to learn the basic grammatical structure of the Japanese language and be able to use it.
listening comprehension	The goal is to be able to hear the necessary information from discourse and soliloquies in everyday life.
Conversation	The goal is for students to be able to perform necessary interactions in daily life alone without the help of others.
Writing (an essay, prose, etc.)	Students will learn the basics of Japanese writing and learn to write on familiar topics.
Reading Comprehension (JLPT/EJU)	Students will be able to read and understand coherent texts of 350~500 characters, including explanatory texts using the vocabulary and sentence patterns they have learned.
Characters and vocabulary (Kanji)	Students are expected to understand approximately 500 kanji characters and be able to use basic vocabulary in appropriate situations.

JLPT Preparation	Students will review what they have learned, become familiar with the format of the exam, and aim to pass N4 to N3.

<Intermediate level>

(school) subject	Target
General Japanese	The goal of this course is to increase vocabulary and expressions, and to develop communication skills to convey what you want to say.
Grammar (JLPT)	Students will learn and be able to use not only everyday expressions but also sentence patterns used in writing.
Listening Comprehension (JLPT/EJU)	The goal is for students to be able to listen to conversations and explanations in daily life, understand the main points, and listen to the necessary information.
Writing (an essay, prose, etc.)	Students will summarize their thoughts on familiar topics and be able to write sentences of 400-600 characters according to the Japanese writing style.
Reading Comprehension (JLPT/EJU)	Students will be able to read longer sentences with paragraphs to understand the content and gather necessary information.
Characters and vocabulary (Kanji)	The goal is to increase vocabulary, understand about 1,000 kanji characters, and be able to select the correct word, given the context.
JLPT Preparation	Through question practice, students will aim to pass N3 to N2.

<Advanced level>

(School) Subject	Target
General Japanese	Students will be able to accurately understand the content of coherent sentences and discourse, and be able to express their own opinions using appropriate expressions for the situation.
Grammar (JLPT)	The goal of this course is to acquire and be able to use sentence pattern expressions such as those covered in N2 to N1.

Listening Comprehension (JLPT/EJU)	The goal is to be able to listen to relatively long soliloquies and talks and be able to understand the speaker's intentions and necessary information.
Writing (an essay, prose, etc.)	The goal is to be able to use different styles of writing and to write coherent sentences that are theoretically consistent.
Reading Comprehension (JLPT/EJU)	Students are expected to be able to read sentences of 500 to 1,000 words and be able to read the facts, cause-and-effect relationships, and the author's ideas.
Characters and vocabulary (Kanji)	The goal is to further increase the number of Kanji characters and usable vocabulary, as well as to be able to increase Kanji characters and vocabulary autonomously.
JLPT Preparation	Students will practice with mock questions, etc., and aim to pass N2 to N1.
EJU Preparation	Students will practice to become familiar with Japanese exam questions so that they can cope with EJU General Subjects, Mathematics, and other questions.

#### ◇ Qualifications of candidacy

- ① Those who have a strong desire to enter a Japanese university, graduate school, or vocational school.
- ② Those who have completed (or expect to complete) 12 years of school education or equivalent.
- ③ Persons who are at least 18 years of age.
- ④ Persons who have been permitted or are expected to be permitted to enter Japan through due process of law.
- ⑤ Applicants must have JLPT N5 level Japanese language proficiency or have studied Japanese for at least 150 hours.

- (1) Extracurricular activity fee (8,800 yen), insurance fee (10,000 yen), and medical examination fee (6,600 yen) are expected. (including tax)

For the second year of the 1.5-year College Preparatory Course, activity fee (4,400 yen), insurance fee (5,800 yen), and medical examination fee (6,600 yen) are expected. (including tax)

\*Insurance and health examination fees are subject to change due to price changes.

- (2) Insurance premium is the cost of insurance for foreign students in case of injury or accident. The insurance fee is approximately 10,000 yen, although it varies according to the annual revision of the insurance premiums. Once paid, the insurance fee is nonrefundable.

The premium for the second year is payable at the end of the first year.

- (3) The medical checkup fee is the cost of a medical checkup conducted once each year.

◇ Notes on studying with a college student visa

- ① International students must have a Permit to Engage in Activity other than that Permitted under the Status of Residence to work part-time.
- ② The number of hours of part-time work must be within the range of 28 hours per week, and the type of work is limited. It is also difficult to find a part-time job immediately after arriving in Japan; please bring enough money to live on for about 3 months.
- ③ International students are required to enroll in the National Health Insurance System in addition to the tuition fee. Insurance premiums are to be paid by the student.
- ④ For the 2-year course, the fees for 3 JLPTs and 2 JTESTs; for the 1.5-year course, the fees for 2 JLPTs and 2 JTESTs will be charged as a deposit when requesting tuition fees before entering Japan.
- ⑤ Students must be committed to learning without absences, tardiness, or early dismissal.
- ⑥ Smoking is prohibited in and around the school and in the dormitories.  
In addition, there are only a limited number of places in Japan where smoking is allowed.
- ⑦ If you have a tattoo, you may be limited in the type of work you can do if you want

to find a job in Japan in the future.

#### ◇ Tuition Refund Policy

If you are unable to enroll in the school after submitting your application, the application fee will be refunded according to the following

Regardless of whether the “Certificate of Eligibility” is issued or not, the application fee is non-refundable for any reason. (Even if you cancel your application for the “Certificate of Eligibility” after it has been submitted but before it has been issued, you must still pay the application fee.

#### ◇ Admission Screening

Admission is based on an assessment of Japanese language proficiency (online or in person) and a document review.

Japanese language proficiency will be screened by an interview and a written test. The written examination may include mathematics.

Applicants who pass both examinations may apply to the Immigration Bureau for study abroad.
